2.1 After 40 years of wandering around the desert the children of Israel finally cross the swollen river Jordan and enter the promised land. But as they do God tells them to STOP and collect 12 stones: "Go over before the ark of the LORD your God into the middle of the Jordan. Each of you is to take up a stone on his shoulder, according to the number of the tribes of the Israelites." (4:5)

2.2 Sign (4:6)

- God 'tells them to take up twelve stones from the middle of the Jordan' (v3) 'to serve as a SIGN among you' (v6)
- On Remembrance Sunday every year we wear poppies as a SIGN

2.3 Thanks (4:7)

- God tells them that the 12 stones were to remind them to THANK God for cutting
 off the flow of the River Jordan so that they could cross into the Promised Land on
 dry ground.
- On Remembrance Sunday every year we give thanks for the lives of men and women who died in order that we might live under the democratic rule of law.

2.4 Others (4:6)

- God wants the next generation OTHERS to remember: In the future, when your children ask you, 'What do these stones mean?' Remind them what God did as they entered the Promised Land.
- Remembrance Sunday enables us to remind 'the next generation' of war and its terrible consequences.

2.4 Perpetual (4:7)

- God wants the 12 stones to be a PERPETUAL memorial to the Israelites entry into the promised land: 'These stones are to be a memorial to the people of Israel FOREVER'
- Remembrance Sunday acts as a PERPETUAL reminder of those who were lost but also of the consequences of war.
