

**The Parish of Wellow**  
**Colossians 1:9-14 – ‘Paul: A Prisoner’s Prayer’**  
**Passage, Talk Notes and Questions**

Please feel free to take these talk notes home with you and you may wish to find some time during this week to consider the questions below.

**1. Talk Passage – Colossians 1:9-14**

9 For this reason, since the day we heard about you, we have not stopped praying for you and asking God to fill you with the knowledge of his will through all spiritual wisdom and understanding.<sup>10</sup> And we pray this in order that you may live a life worthy of the Lord and may please him in every way: bearing fruit in every good work, growing in the knowledge of God,<sup>11</sup> being strengthened with all power according to his glorious might so that you may have great endurance and patience, and joyfully<sup>12</sup> giving thanks to the Father, who has qualified you to share in the inheritance of the saints in the kingdom of light.<sup>13</sup> For he has rescued us from the dominion of darkness and brought us into the kingdom of the Son he loves,<sup>14</sup> in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins.

**2. Talk Notes**

1. Introduction

- How good are we at praying for our Christian brothers and sisters? How good are we at praying for Christians we have never met and do not know.
- Paul is in prison in Rome awaiting trial. Despite his own situation Paul is focussed on others.
- Everything that Paul knows about the church in Colosse comes from their faithful pastor and founder, Epaphras.
- This church has clearly grown but its converts are struggling with false teachers, false beliefs and the prevailing anti-Christian cultures of their day – with the result that they are being tempted to water down the key truths of the gospel.
- Paul is clearly moved and worried by Epaphras’ news. He is moved not only to prayer but also to write to this church in Colosse – a place to which he has never been and to a group of Christians he has never met.
- In Colossians 1:9-13 we get an instructive insight into Paul’s prayer life. Paul models for us how to pray for our fellow Christians, even when we do not know them. Note that Paul’s requests centre on *spiritual* matters, not on material or physical ones. He asks God:
  - a) To help them know what he wants them to do. (1:9)
  - b) To help them live for him (1:10)
  - c) To give them strength for endurance (1:11)
  - d) To fill them with thankfulness for who he is and what he has done (1:12-14)

2. Paul asks God to help them know what he wants them to do (1:9)

- Paul prays that the church in Colosse will in effect deepen and strengthen its’ relationship with God and that this relationship will be built on what God wants them to do rather than on what they want to do.
- So often in prayer we come to God with our own agenda and expect him to endorse it. Paul prays that the Colossians will seek God’s will in prayer: -

*‘be filled with the knowledge of his will’*

- The false teachers were trying to persuade the Colossians that in order to be better Christians they needed to know more. They needed a better understanding of the Bible. They needed ‘to earn through knowledge’ their salvation.
  - This type of false teaching is so very dangerous because it undermines what Jesus did on the Cross. We have relationship and salvation because of what Jesus has done, there is nothing that we can do to earn it. The Colossians need to believe and trust in this, but do we?
3. Paul asks God to help them live for him (1:10)
- As our relationship grows and develops with the Lord, says Paul, it will lead to changed behaviour.
  - The false teachers were advocating that ‘more knowledge’ would produce better behaviour hence better Christians.
  - We can have all the knowledge in the world, but if we are not in relationship our lives will not be changed or affected one iota!
  - How would we describe our relationship with the Lord at the moment?
4. Paul asks God to give them strength for endurance (1:11)
- Paul knew from his own experiences that walking in close relationship with God is not easy.
  - We cannot do it in our strength says Paul we need God’s constant help and assistance.
  - Do we seek God’s assistance in this ongoing spiritual warfare?
5. Paul asks God to fill them with thankfulness for who he is and what he has done (1:12-14)
- Paul prays that the Colossians Christians will develop an attitude of thanksgiving – a central theme of this whole letter.
  - Paul believes, again contrary to what is being peddled by the false teachers, that a sign of healthy and mature Christians is a gratitude to God for the extraordinary things he has done in Jesus.
6. Paul’s prayer should encourage us to pray for missionaries, for our Christian brothers and sisters in different parts of the world who we do not know. Let us this week specifically pray for those who Christians we do not know. Let us ask God that they will:
- e) understand God’s will
  - f) bear good fruit
  - g) have great endurance and patience
  - h) give thanks always

- 4) Surely a better understanding of the Bible is a good thing. Why does Paul berate the false teachers for promoting this?
  - 5) If relationship is key to our faith, how do we build and develop our relationship with the Lord?
  - 6) As a church are we *‘bearing good fruit’*?

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
