




Editorial

April's special offer (available all year)

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene went to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the entrance. So she came running to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one Jesus loved, and said, "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we don't know where they have put him!" So Peter and the other disciple started for the tomb. Both were running, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent over and looked in at the strips of linen lying there but did not go in. Then Simon Peter came along behind him and went straight into the tomb. He saw the strips of linen lying there, as well as the cloth that had been wrapped around Jesus' head. The cloth was still lying in its place, separate from the linen. Finally the other disciple, who had reached the tomb first, also went inside. He saw and believed.

(John 20:1-8) What does April make you think of? I love the crisp whiff of spring which lifts my spirits, seeing all the spring flowers and signs of new life, and even the refreshing April showers. Everything in nature seems full of new possibilities and hope and I find a new spring in my step. And as the seasons of the year turn, so Easter comes round for another time. And here is the opportunity for new life, new possibilities and new hope.

We've heard the story so many times: Jesus whose life was characterised by love, who captivated crowds with his words and who deeply touched the lives of individuals, was unjustly sentenced to death by the establishment and against all expectations returned to life 3 days later, defeating death. But it's easy to be like the disciple who stood outside the tomb, seeing the empty shroud, but unsure about going in. This new life that Jesus offers can only be experienced by entering into his welcome and invitation. We can anticipate the wonderful chocolatey taste of a packaged Easter egg, but it isn't until we take off the foil and actually eat it, that we can fully enjoy and experience it.

This Easter offers another opportunity to journey through this whole story – to bring to Jesus the pain that we feel about so many things going on in our world and our own lives, knowing that he, too, has known betrayal, rejection, unjustified allegations, physical pain and suffering. In the emptiness of the waiting between Jesus' death on Good Friday and his resurrection on Easter Sunday, we can bring to him the things that we do not understand, the unanswered questions, the things we have longed for for so long. And we can enter into the joy of Easter Sunday – Jesus has taken the consequences of all that is wrong in ourselves and our world in his death on the cross and in rising from the dead has opened the way for us to enter into new intimacy and new life with God, the offer of forgiveness and transformation, living our lives in the friendship of Jesus who loves us enough to lay down his life for us.

Shoscombe Parish Council - Clerk's Report

We'll be holding our next full Parish Council on 22nd March, and because this is after the April Newsletter deadline, I will report on the meeting in the next piece.

We have received notification of a road closure along Wellow Road from the Eckweek Road junction east towards Bourne Farm. I have put the notification on the notice boards. This isn't until 29th April though so B&NES are giving plenty of notice.

You will have seen the **NOTICE OF VACANCY IN OFFICE OF COUNCILLOR** in the notice boards recently. As a result, there could be an election on 12th May to fill these five vacancies; we will know more in early April. If you're interested in knowing what's involved, or have any questions about this important part of Shoscombe life, please do get in touch. There'll be more information on the Notice Boards about the election in due course.

Some time ago, funds were allocated for updating the play area, and after much research and discussion, we've narrowed down the options for a new piece of equipment for younger children. Repairs have also been completed.

Following on from the last newsletter piece, we have heard our Village Agent will be Kate Stobie. I will be meeting up with her soon so will give you more information when I have it.

I have copied below some information from B&NES about the £150.00 energy rebate which you may find helpful:

Residents across Bath and North East Somerset are being encouraged to set up Direct Debit payments for their council tax to receive their £150 energy rebate faster. The government recently announced that residents living in properties in Council Tax bands A to D will receive the one-off £150 payment to help with rises in fuel bills. Eligible households, who pay council tax by Direct Debit, will see the money automatically paid into their bank accounts from April. Those who don't pay by Direct Debit will be invited to make a claim for the rebate at a later date.

Councillor Richard Samuel, Deputy Leader and cabinet member for Economic Development and Resources said: "Almost three-quarters of all homes in Bath and North East Somerset, around 64,000 properties are in Council Tax bands A-D which means just under £9.6m will be available in energy rebates.

"We are yet to receive full details of the scheme but to speed up the process and ensure you receive your rebate automatically, please consider signing up to pay your bill by Direct Debit, if you do not already do so. It will be the quickest way to get your rebate."

AN ANALYSIS OF THE BEAUCHAMP ESTATE AUCTION CATALOGUE AND MAP 1948 IN THE AREA AROUND SHOSCOMBE

PART 3

The situation with regard to sewage was somewhat unsavoury and there are a number of small buildings or flat stones by the side or over of the little stream that runs down the Shoscombe valley. Some of them still exist today. Outside earth closets were also common often at the end of gardens. These are making a come-back now as the modern version is considered to be environmentally friendly. Those with WCs in the larger houses had cesspits built underground. These are noted in the descriptions of Braysdown Bungalow and Foxcote Farm which shared theirs with Foxcote Rectory, and there is evidence of a cesspit in the garden of the Old Rectory in Shoscombe (1928) before mains drainage was introduced. The date of installation of mains drainage in the area as a whole is not known, but must be related to the date of the installation of the sewage works. A deed to allow a sewer to cross land near Rose Cottage in 1967 was one of the items originally collected when the Shoscombe Local History Society started. Before then it is rumoured that the WCs in the wash-houses associated with Railway Cottages ran straight down into Wellow Brook. Probably other streamlets contributed to waste drainage in the same way.

It would seem that electricity was not widely available until the 1950s. Woodborough House had access to it, of course, and electric light is specifically mentioned in Bridge Farm at Camerton and in some of the houses in Peasedown. During the war people who wanted to listen to the radio had to take the batteries to Peasedown to get them charged. So most people would have relied on paraffin lamps and candles, coal or wood ranges and open fires for heat and the cooking of food. Access to a wash house where water could be heated in a large container was something to be desired. Fortunately the wash-houses at the Colliery were available to service the miners' immediate needs. Since 1948, the number of dwellings has increased; electricity, water and drainage facilities have been made available. Many of the dwellings have increased in size by added extensions and occasionally by amalgamating two cottages into one. Two churches have become private dwellings, the school which played such an important life in the village has also increased in size and facilities, but unfortunately we have lost the railway.

Terracycle

The next Terracycle dates are Thursday 21st and Saturday 23rd April.

Items that can be recycled at the Methodist Church in Peasedown St John are:

Bread bags, crisp/nut/pretzel/popcorn packets, toothbrushes, dental floss plastic packaging, interdental brushes, toothpaste tubes, biscuit/chocolate and sweet wrappers, cheese wrappers, spectacles and cases, ink cartridges.



Pet food pouches are no longer accepted at Terracycle but Pets at Home in Brislington do take them for recycling – as does the big Tesco in Midsomer Norton (which also takes plastic bags and food wrappings).
