“Small World” by Matthew Street, The Vicar, based on Luke 10:29-37

Anxious to save face, the lawyer asked Jesus, “Ah yes, but just who is my neighbour?” “A man was travelling on the Jerusalem-Jericho road,” answered Jesus, “when he was ambushed by bandits, who beat him up and made off with all he had, even his clothes, leaving him critically ill. A little later, a priest happened to be passing that way. When he saw the unfortunate fellow, he gave him a wide berth and hurried on past. Similarly, a Levite chanced upon him, he too keeping at a safe distance and moving hastily on his way. A Samaritan came by next, and the moment he spotted the man he rushed to his aid. Deeply concerned at his plight, he tended his injuries, salving them with oil and wine.

Then, placing the man on his donkey, he took him to an inn and continued to look after him for the rest of the day. Next morning, he handed the innkeeper two denarii, with the instruction, “Take good care of him. I’ll settle the bill when I return, so don’t worry about the cost.” What do you reckon: which of these three proved to be a neighbour to the man set upon by bandits?” “The one who had compassion on him,” answered the lawyer. “Then off you go and do the same,” said Jesus. (Luke 10:29-37)

“It’s a small world. Today that seems more true than ever. We can travel across the globe in a matter of hours, watch events live by satellite from thousands of miles away, and talk to people in distant continents almost as if they are in our own front room. That fact brings enormous blessings but also new responsibilities and demands. Who is my neighbour?” the lawyer asked Jesus. The answer was anyone and everyone.

Two thousand years ago that challenge must have seemed daunting enough; today it is massive, for suddenly every person in every country has become our concern; every disaster, our disaster; everyone our neighbour. When floods strike Bangladesh, we know; when famine hits Sudan, we know; when students are massacred in Tiananmen Square, we know. Day after day, pictures of emaciated children confront us as we sit down to our meal of plenty; of the homeless as we sit in the warmth and comfort of our homes; of the poor as we enjoy an ever-rising standard of living. All these are our neighbours in today’s small world. Charity may begin at home but it

Wellow Parish Council

The Parish Council met on 8th January in the Village Hall. Twelve residents attended this meeting to address the matters on the agenda. The following matters were raised by the residents at the Public Participation section:

Public Participation: It was mentioned by the Parish Sweeper that there is a leaning memorial stone at the cemetery. The Parish Council agreed to investigate and to help with this.

Recent flooding at the western side of the village was brought to the attention of the Council. Unusually large volumes of water coming down Cemetery Road overwhelmed the road drains and flooded nearby houses. A question was asked if there is anything can be done to divert the water. The Parish Council informed residents that a landowner of the adjacent fields was approached recently to see whether any change in farming activities have taken place which could have caused this. The landowner confirmed that there were no changes to his activities. It was decided that B&NES Flooding Officer will be contacted for advice on preventing the flooding in the future.

A house was also flooded on Link Hill, Farm Lane, between the village and the Twinhoe crossroads where water runs off from the fields.

A resident reported that passing lorries had hit their house on Link Hill, Farm Lane, twice last year and asked if a “Quiet Lane” can be designated. It was unclear whether designation of a Quiet Lane would prevent HGVs using the lane. The resident was informed that this issue has recently been discussed with a B&NES Highways Officer but Highways will not allow installation of a “7.5 tonne max.” sign approx. half way up Farm Lane without provision of a turning point on the highway. The Parish Council will consult with property owners at the bottom of Farm Lane, at its junction with the High Street about installation of appropriate signage and approach B&NES Highways for advice.

Planning Applications:

Sulis Down development: At the recent Planning Committee meeting, the decision was deferred due to the requirement for additional traffic surveys. Noted.

Mill Hill enforcement case: the Parish Council informed the meeting that an enforcement notice has been issued on 29 November, that no appeal has been received within the permitted 30 days and that therefore the landowner must reinstate the site by 29 March 2024.

23/03903/TCA: Footpath, Railway Lane. Permitted

23/04347/TCA: 4 Henley View. No objection.

Public Survey feedback: Following the recent Parish Survey, the Parish Council confirmed that the following issue concern residents the most and designated Councillor responsibilities accordingly:

Traffic: Chris Cook (traffic survey to be published shortly)

Climate and Environment: Jonathan Luck

Planning: Mike Clarkson

Parking: Dave Workman (exact issues still to be identified)

Wellow Valley Tennis: The tennis court lights are to be upgraded to LEDs. The new lights will be more cost efficient and will also reduce the light spill onto neighbouring houses.

The tennis courts are 9 years old this year and need to be repainted, including a special primer to avoid iron staining. The painting work will start in late Spring.

Wellow Community Bus: The repairs to the bus have now been completed. A new driver has been hired, who is waiting for the DBS check to be completed. Wellow Community Bus Group is currently fundraising for a replacement bus, which is expected to be purchased by the middle of 2024.

Highways & Transport: The following updates were received:

Application to install a Speed Indication Device (SID): the funding application will be submitted to the Avon & Somerset Police Community Trust in April 2024. The Council was advised that at least 4-6 volunteers will be needed to manage SID i.e. change batteries and move locations. It is considered that a moveable SID device is more effective. A final decision on a type of SID to be acquired is to be made at the next meeting. Discussions took place about the maintenance cost associated with

the SID management (the need to train volunteers every 4 year (about £1,500/4yr) plus cost of replacement batteries.) B&NES agreement will needed for the installation. It was decided to conduct a resident's survey to gather people's views on traffic issues, on SID's and also to find volunteers who will be able to look after the moveable device.

Traffic survey: to be conducted.

Speed Watch: In the pre-Christmas period, 12 vehicles were reported doing 34mph in 20mph limit zone at the west end of the village.

Environment: The recent Village Survey showed that environmental issues were amongst the most concerning. Wellow Futures group is organising a carbon offset scheme - residents will be invited to donate money to offset their carbon footprint if they take flights. These funds will be used for village projects aimed at reducing our community's carbon footprint. The PC is providing the banking facility for this purpose but will not be involved in management or decision making.

The PC's Environment Policy is to be updated.

The PC received an email about smoke pollution created by logging business in the village. B&NES environmental department have requested to collect evidence of a smoke pollution. A log with dates and pictures will be collated and provided by a resident.

Wellow Recreation: It was mentioned that a quote for £2,500 was received for replacing the cricket nets. A decision is to be made dependent on the usage of the cricket nets.

The Wellow 10K will take place on Sunday 3 March

It was confirmed that an Outdoor Theatre performance by Miracle Theatre is being organised for 11 July 2024.

Community Infrastructure Levy:

Village Clock repair (£820): Update on completion of the repair works to be received.

Repair of the gates on Railway Lane (£1000): There appears to be an issue of ownership of the gates on Railway Lane. The Clerk will write to the owner to ask if the gates can be repaired.

The composting Committee have raised £1,500 for the new compost bin. The Parish Council will transfer the matching £1,500 as decided at the last meeting.

It was decided that the remaining available funds will be used to buy a bench for the Play Park.

Grant Applications: The following grant applications was approved for the financial year 2024-25:

Wellow Community Bus: £2,000

Midsomer Norton Dial a Ride: £50

Parish newsletter : £100

Finance and Administration: The Council agreed to adopt the following mission statement: 'Nurturing our socially vibrant community whilst protecting our beautiful natural environment'.

Public Participation procedures are to be reviewed along with the Standing Orders for approval at the next meeting.

It was agreed to set the Precept for 2024-25 at £16,040. It was noted that the precept amount remains unchanged for the last 5 years.

Help Save The Planet! (and Wellow)



Ever felt a bit guilty as you book your holiday or business flight about its impact on climate change and your personal carbon footprint? Ideally, we should all try to cut back on air travel. If you choose to fly however, the Wellow Carbon Offset Fund is a wholly voluntary idea that can help turn your guilty feeling into positive local action.

You will have seen international ‘carbon offset’ schemes that, through a small payment, help offset the impact of your flight by funding rainforest protection, tree planting or similar. However, knowing how your money is actually being used is difficult to assess and some of those schemes have been exposed as having limited impact.

The Wellow Carbon Offset Fund (WeCOF) will mean you can offset your flight’s CO2 emissions secure in the knowledge that your money is going directly towards reducing the carbon footprint of Wellow. It will be doing things that help promote sustainability and building our community resources. (Though doing so should not encourage you to fly more – the big aim must be less flying).

How it will work is simple:

1. You calculate your or your family’s flight carbon footprint and related offset payment using any recognised website e.g. <https://www.clevel.co.uk/flight-carbon-calculator/>
2. You pay that amount (or any other sum you see fit) into the Fund¹.
3. The amount in the Fund will be publicised from time to time and ideas/proposals invited for how it should be used.
4. The money will be allocated in the best way to benefit carbon reduction and the community. Everyone who has contributed can have a say in how it is used.

¹ The Fund is being looked after by the Parish Council to ensure the money is safe, but the Parish Council have no other role in its management or operation, which will be done by a group of volunteers from the Parish.

Examples of a possible carbon offset payment (single person, return flight):

- £9.84 economy class to Ibiza
- £17.66 economy class to Athens
- £51.78 economy class to Mumbai
- £109.88 business class to New York.

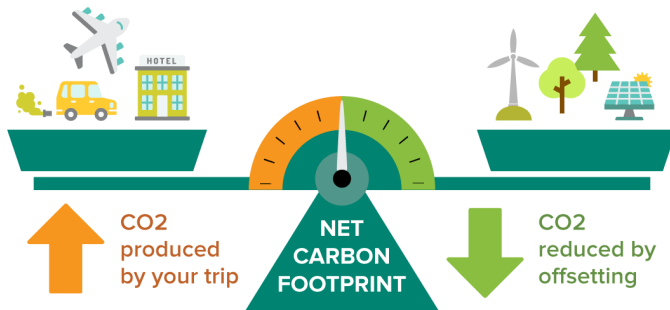
How the money is used will depend on the ideas submitted, but MIGHT include (**note, these are not proposals or intentions, just some examples of possible ideas**):

- Solar panels on community owned/run buildings
- An electric car charger so people without off street access could swap petrol/diesel for electric
- Helping to replace oil or similar boilers with heat pumps

- Land/plant management initiatives that help reduce CO2
- Traffic reduction initiatives
