"Daring to Trust" by Matthew Street, The Vicar, based on Acts 9:10-14.

There was a certain disciple in Damascus by the name of Ananias, and the Lord spoke to him in a vision, saying, "Ananias." He answered, "I'm here, Lord." The Lord said to him, "Get up and go to the street known as The Straight, and there look in the house of Judas for a man called Saul of Tarsus. He is praying at this very moment, and in a vision he has seen a man called Ananias enter and lay hands on him so that he might recover his sight." But Ananias protested, "Lord, I have heard from many people about this man, about all his cruelty to your saints in Jerusalem, and how he has come here now with authority from the chief priests to arrest all those who confess your name." (Acts 9:10-14)

What would you do if you sensed danger looming? The answer is obvious: you'd do everything possible to avoid it. Should you be the adventurous type, it's possible that you might flirt with it for a moment but, if you felt your life was on the line, you'd ultimately want to ensure your own safety. That, no doubt, was paramount in the mind of Ananias, having heard that Saul, persecutor of the Church, was in town. Quite simply, he was keeping his head down until the danger had passed, hoping against hope that he would not hear the fateful knock on the door summoning him to imprisonment and almost certain death. Imagine his surprise, then, when another summons came, calling him to seek out this man who struck fear into the heart of every Christian, and to knock on his door! It was asking a lot, to say the least!

Would you have obeyed that call, or would you have made excuses to evade it, dismissed it as ridiculous, looked the other way? Had Ananias done any of those, who can say how different the history of the Christian Church might have been? It took his faith and courage to finish the transformation of Saul, enemy of the faith, into Paul, its greatest ambassador. When God asks you to step out in faith, will you have the courage, like Ananias, to say yes?

Wellow Parish Council

The Wellow Parish Council meeting took place on Tuesday on 21 June in the Village Hall for the first time since the start of the lockdown with 6 Councillors and 10 residents present.

The Parish Council and the Horticultural Society presented Shirley Betts, who resigned from her post of the Councillor earlier in this year, with flowers and thanked her for many years of commitments to the Wellow community. Everyone thanked Shirley and wished her good luck in her new adventures.

Public participation: It was mentioned that the verge by the Church is overgrown and the track at Henley view is in bad condition.

It was also mentioned that parking in Canteen Lane is getting better as residents are parking in a more considerate way.

Wildflower verges campaign: Following complaints to BANES from a resident, flowering verges in the vicinity of Wellow have recently been cut back by BANES. Concerns have been raised to the Parish Council by other residents about native wildflowers and rare species, which grow in these verges and which have been cut back quite extensively before their natural cycle is complete. In order to prevent this happening in the future, the PC will mark out areas in the village, which can be allowed to stay wild to promote the development of native endangered species. BANES will be requested once again not to cut these areas before the end of summer.

Highways & Transport: Wellow Traffic working group have conducted a research and following updates were received: two quotes are being obtained from independent highway specialists for conducting speed surveys in the village, the traffic group is looking into establishing communication with BANES Highways about type of speeding evidence, which can prove speeding issue in the village; investigating possibility of installing speed bumps in the village. WPC was asked to research the possibility of obtaining Section 106 funding from the new Odd Down development. The Clerk will look into this.

Play Park: The annual playground safety inspection have been completed by Ro-SPA (Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents) and the report provided to the Council. New turf is being laid in the playground as well as new drainage installed in the playing field to prevent water going into the gardens, adjacent to it.

Discussions took place whether the remaining funds from the playpark project should be spent on the additional play equipment – this will require extra fundraising or could be put aside as a contingency for the future upkeep and renewals of the existing play equipment. It was suggested that a sandpit is installed in the playpark. After some consideration, it was decided that it would not be feasible as the sandpit will require regular maintenance and protection from elements.

Parish Plan: The Parish Plan Team reported that the project has been halted as not much response received from the villagers. The team is working on new ideas, which could be implemented with the ease of lockdown.

The next Parish Council meeting is scheduled for Monday 12th July in the Village Hall at 7.30pm.

Water Safety and the Dangers of Swimming at the Environment Agency Flume in Wellow

The Environment Agency, which manages a concrete flume at Wellow just upstream of the ford, wants people to remember the hazards under the water in rivers while spending time with friends and family. People should not jump or dive into water and stay away from the site, which is privately owned and monitored by CCTV. The Environment Agency uses this location to monitor water levels using sensitive equipment. This combination of underwater obstacles and strong currents is very dangerous. For your own safety do not enter the water or surrounding area to access the structure.
