RECIPE FOR CLASS 111

Ingredients: 100g Butter or Margerine

110g Caster Sugar

2 medium Eggs

110g Self Raising Flour

Strawberry Jam

Method

- 1. Heat the oven to 180C/350F/Gas 4.
- 2. Line 2x18cm / 7" cake tins with baking parchment

3. Use a hand mixer to cream the butter and the sugar together until pale.
4. Beat in the eggs.
5. Sift over the flour and fold in using a large metal spoon. The mixture should be of a dropping consistency - if it isn't, add a little milk.
6. Divide the mixture between the cake tins and gently spread out with a spatula.
7. Bake for 20-25 minutes until an inserted skewer comes out clean.
8. Allow to stand for 5 minutes before turning on to a wire rack to cool.
9. Sandwich the cakes together with jam

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR EXHIBITORS

1. Registration for all classes will be taken at the Village Hall, Wellow on the following dates:-

THURSDAY 3rd September 7.00 - 9.00 p.m.

FRIDAY 4th September 3.00 - 8.00 p.m.

No entries whatsoever will be accepted after the later date shown. Postal entries, together with the appropriate fees, may be sent to the Secretary to arrive not later than Friday 4th September.

2. An exhibitor may make any number of entries in a class but is eligible for only one Prize.

3. The Committee reserve the right to visit the garden of an exhibitor, who must show all produce in a growing state.

4. **Exhibits must be placed in the 'Flower and Produce Marquee' between 8.00am and 10.00am on the day of the Show.** No person, other than the stewards and judges may enter the marquee after 10.00am until the Show opens at 1.30pm.

5. The judges decisions are final. A judge may withhold an award if in his/her opinion an exhibit is of insufficient merit or may make an inferior award.

6. No exhibit shall be removed from the 'Flower and Produce Marquee' until after 5.00pm. Any produce left will be sold by auction.

7. The presentation of Cups and other Awards will take place at the Secretary's tent at 5.00pm.

Prize monies will be paid out at the Treasurers tent between 3 - 5pm. Monies not claimed by 5.30pm, will deem to have been donated to the Society's funds.

8. Cups remain the property of the Society and holders are held responsible for any loss or damage incurred while in their possession. Present holders of cups must return them to the Secretary by not later than the 31st July to allow time for renovation.

9. The Committee will take all reasonable care of exhibits but will not be responsible for any loss or damage.
